Dedication of Renovated Vault

On February 1, 2005, a small but festive event took place at the Bethlehem Moravian Archives when the completely renovated second vault of the archives was dedicated. Last May, Dr. Carter Litchfield, a former member of the Archives' Board, came to visit the facility. When Dr. Litchfield asked if the archives was in need of new shelving I eagerly answered affirmatively, knowing there was little free shelving space left in either one of the two vaults. With the help of many volunteers the contents of the second vault were packed into boxes and transferred to the reading room. In November, after installing

new lighting fixtures and painting the ceiling, the new shelving arrived. With movable shelving the ranges stand close together; space is therefore used much more efficiently compared with stationary shelving where each range requires an aisle. To access the needed row, we simply move the shelves back and forth along tracks mounted in the floor. This efficient means of storage nearly doubles the shelving capacity! During a meeting of the Archives' Board Dr. Litchfield and his wife Carol officially donated the new shelving to the archives. When asked about the reason behind his generosity, Dr. Litchfield responded by recounting

fond memories of his experiences at the archives while conducting research for his publication on the Bethlehem Oil Mill. (copies of this valuable study can still be ordered from the Archives for \$ 15.00)

Spotlight: Zinzendorf Family Portrait

In the painting collection of the Moravian Archives there is an image of Nikolaus Ludwig von Zinzendorf as a little boy, together with his parents Georg Ludwig and Charlotte Justine, nee von Gersdorf. There are some unusual aspects about this image, which - to my knowledge - has never been published before. Zinzendorf's father died on July 9, 1700,

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only six weeks after his son was born. His mother then moved to her mother's residence in Grosshennersdorf, where Ludwig remained and grew up, even after his mother remarried in December 1704 and moved to live in Berlin. A family portrait like this could therefore not have been painted in reality, but other images must have been combined to create this painting. In this case the artist composed the image using two other paintings. Anyone familiar with the painting collection at the Unity Archives in Herrnhut recognizes the images the unidentified artist used. The Herrnhut archives possesses a portrait of Zinzendorf as a little boy that bears a striking resemblance to the boy depicted on the Bethlehem portrait. The Unity Archives is also in possession of a double portrait of Zinzendorf's parents that was the obvious model for the Bethlehem portrait. There are some differences of course. The Bethlehem portrait leaves out a comforting message that Georg Ludwig hands to Charlotte Justine on the Herrnhut painting. But the Bethlehem painting includes a message written above the

small boy's head: "Do not worry, my son. We may be poor but we will have many a thing if we fear God, avoid sin and do good." While the Herrnhut double portrait contains consoling words to the widow, the Bethlehem family portrait speaks to the little boy.

Interestingly, the double portrait of the Zinzendorfs was also constructed after other originals. The artist used a portrait of Georg Ludwig von Zinzendorf by Daniel de Savoye (also in Herrnhut) and an image of Charlotte Justine that was destroyed in 1945. It seems likely that the Bethlehem Zinzendorf family portrait can be dated around 1705. If a family portrait was desired at a later date, the artist would most likely have chosen to show little Zinzendorf as an older boy. This might therefore be the oldest oil painting that the Bethlehem Moravian Archives has in its possession. This painting was given to the archives by the De Schweinitz family, descendants of the Zinzendorfs. Although it seems to have been restored in the past, new restoration by a trained professional is now neces-

The Archives is offering a course in reading 18th century German script for the 35th time this year! This year's course will be held from June 6 - 17. For more information, please call the Archives or visit our website.

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
Records from the Bethlehem Choir Houses

A unique feature of an 18th century Moravian community was the division of the congregation into specific groups, or choirs. Every member, according to his or her stage in life, belonged to such a choir. Each choir (from the Greek χορος) had its own leaders, its own worship services and its own special choir festivals. Some of the choirs, like the Single Brothers, the Single Sisters or the Widows, lived together in their own choir houses. The

records from two of these choirs in Bethlehem, the Single Brothers and the Single Sisters, were recently catalogued. The new inventories can be found on our website. These records give insight into the unique spiritual and economic life of the choirs. Both the Sisters and the Brothers had their own trades and shops and almost all of the account books still survive! The importance Moravians attributed to every individual is reflected in the

extensive biographical information on the members of the choirs. The surviving choir diaries provide information on the main daily events within the choirs.
